Did You Know?

- There are 40,000 species of spiders around the world
- All spiders will bite, but only 25 species of spiders have harmful venom (poison)
- The 'black-widow' and 'brown recluse' in the U.S. have dangerous venom
- The Funnel Web spider of Eastern Australia is the most venomous
- The Goliath Birdeater tarantula spider is the biggest (legs 12 inches, South America)
- All spiders can spin webs of silk, but not all spiders do spin webs
 (the Jumping Spider just jumps on its prey)
- A baby spider is called a 'spiderling'
- Spiders can spin 200 yards of silk in a day.
- Spiders can spin a web in 30-60 minutes
- There are seven different kinds of silk that a spider can make (sticky and non-sticky)
- Spiders are not insects; they are Arachnids (eight legs in family of scorpions, ticks)
- Arachnophobia is an extreme fear of spiders
- Without spiders to eat mosquitoes, flies, and beetles, the insects would overrun the world!



How to Draw a Spider Web

1. Trace the Spider Web lines. Start with the long lines from the spider. Then trace the 'scoop' lines, starting from the outside of the web. 2. Color the spider any color. 3. Glue on pom-pom balls and googly eyes.
